SESSION 1 WORKSHOPS, 9:30 - 11:00AM

1. Bring your learners' voices together with VoiceThread, Faith Marcel

Online interactive audio and video tools have become an integral part of the digital landscape for ESL teachers and learners. Despite their growing number, few free tools available offer the rich media experience VoiceThread provides, with the hosting of a vast number of audio, video and text file types. In this technology workshop, participants will learn about ways VoiceThread has been used for ESL instruction as an interactive online tool to help make learners' voices heard. Participants will learn to create, comment on and share VoiceThreads with their learners during the course of this session. **Audience**: Intermediate proficiency

2. Achieving excellence in oral communication through the use of technology, *Angelica Galante* Excellence in oral communication is a goal most English language learners wish to attain. Given that spoken English is often a requirement to meet professional, educational, and social demands in Canada, the need for learners to achieve this goal is urgent. Yet, many language practitioners are unsure of what aspects of oral communication to teach and/or how to assess them. This tech workshop will explore how dimensions of oral communication (fluency, pronunciation, presentation skills, grammatical accuracy, among others) can be taught and assessed through the use of technologies such as apps, video and audio recordings, and pronunciation software.

3. LearnIT2teach stage 1 instructor training, Jim Edgar, John Allan

This is the first of four stages for instructors interested in the CIC-funded LearnIT2teach Project. This session explains important e-learning concepts and guides participants through a hands-on exploration of the LINC courseware. Participants can use the courseware at edlinc.ca after completing Stages 1 and 2. Note that this is the only face-to-face requirement for eligible (settlement language) instructors interested in working towards the completion of Stage 4 and receiving TESL Ontario's Post-TESL Certificate Training accreditation in "Developing e-Materials for Language Training.

Audience: Beginner proficiency

4. Basic Word formatting skills, Jennifer Harris

This workshop will focus on basic skills for creating effective and interesting handouts. Tasks will include inserting and formatting pictures, grouping, inserting shapes and lines and changing basic page layout. This workshop is most suitable for beginner level Word users.

5. Learn to use tutela.ca Online repository for ESL professionals, *Pascal St Jean, Diane Ramanathan* Tutela.ca, funded by Citizenship and Immigration Canada, is the online repository and community for ESL professionals across Canada. Tutela.ca provides classroom materials, lesson plans, assessment information, reusable learning objects and much more. In addition, Tutela.ca enables teachers and other professionals to share materials, discover new approaches, get solutions and network.

6. Chips off the old blog, *Joseph Ng*

First presented at TESL Ontario Conference 2012, Chips Off the Old Blog introduces the use of blogs as a tool to extend writing and other skill activities as well as manage an unconventional campus. Being able to author and edit one's own work easily, affordably, and powerfully draws many a learner out of their shells. More than that, the blog community overcomes the barriers of time and space in a way that hasn't been fully explored. This session is ideal for teachers who can email and google but are eager to extend their mileage with minimal downside.

7. What's the Point? PowerPoint tips and techniques, Christopher P. Madden

We will go from the most basic to some highly refined techniques of making and delivering an excellent PowerPoint presentation.

Audience: Beginner proficiency

8. Create a webquest for your OSLT/ ELT class, Jim Edgar, John Allan

This session explains what webquests are, how they can benefit language learning and where to access webquests and related resources online. Using a template, participants will be guided through the steps to make a customized webquest. This workshop is open to all, especially anyone interested in the CIC-funded LearnIT2teach Stage 4.
